# Pet Day is tomorrow!

## Rules

- 1 All dogs need to be tied up along the back tree line. Lambs, goats, calves and ponies should be tied up on the bottom field.
- 2. Only bring your dog if it is safe around kids, other animals and other dogs.
- 3. Bring your own water container and food (if necessary) for your pet.
- 4. Any poo or mess is the responsibility of the person who entered the pet!
- 5. Remember to look after your pet and not let it get stressed out.
- No dogs can come on the bus. If you have a smaller animal that will stay in its cage on the bus, you can check with your bus driver. 6.
- 7. Pets need to be taken home by lunchtime please.
- Please don't be upset if you do not have a pet to bring. 8.

Organisation of the day 9 a.m. Your dog, calf, pony or lamb should be left tied up and all students need to be in class! Animals in cages (chickens, ducks, rabbits etc.) are to be left on display at the sandpit.

After some 'around the ring' events, there will be an obedience event for dogs, to show the dog that is best at "sit, stay, come". It is not compulsory to enter your dog in this event!

There will also be an obstacle course that is open to all pets and not just the dogs. Each pet can only do the obstacle course once.

The Student Council has this year decided not to have a best-dressed pet competition because they believe it is too mean for the animal.

Pets can then be taken home. We guess this will be at about 11 a.m. at the latest.

- Employing specialists, such as Matua Maihi last year for Te Reo, and John Parsons for internet safety education

- Whenua Iti River Safety and leadership courses
- We have also subsidised students to participate in many events such as the Weetbix Tryathlon, Kiwi Exams and Vertical Limits climbing

Over the years profits have also gone to bigger items, such as the kitchen in the Hall, the swimming pool fence and the green round climbing frame on the bottom field. More recently, the BOT have installed a solar water system to heat the swimming pool, and ... breaking news... we have bought a minivan! In the past few years we have contributed something towards the wider community too, such as the local defibrillators, a contribution to the Motueka swimming pool and the Motueka Weedbusters.

Although the Festival is predominantly a fundraising event, it is also an opportunity for the adults in our community to participate, meet others, and show what it means to be a member of a community working together. In anticipation of another great Festival, I thank you for your support.
