Interview with Lili about Fiji All info taken from Savusavu & Kioa

What is the food like?

The fruits and vegetables from supermarkets look like they've been there for a week. Coconuts, pawpaws, mangoes and bananas are everywhere.

What are the roads like?

The Fijian roads are dangerous.

What's the schooling like?

The curriculum: English Maths Heath Social studies Fijian Politics/ history

Did you meet anyone famous?

I met the president and the prime minister of Tavalu

What do they celebrate there?

Kioa day, Diwali, Fiji day and other normal celebrations.

How long does it take to get from island to island?

It takes one hour from Nadi to Savusavu via plane. 15-30 minutes from Natuvu to Kioa.

What the difference in schooling and housing quality?

The schools are old. Their desks are wooden but don't lift up (a picture is below)

They also use chalkboards. They have **devotion** (bible study) every morning.

There is also an assembly where they sing several national anthems and raise the flag every morning. They have a canteen that sells lollies and where you can order your food.

The houses are not flash. Most houses have two different families living inside them. In one Kioa house is four walls, roof and floor, mosquito nets etc.



EVER WANTED TO ENJOY SKATEBOARDING WITHOUT THE RISK?

Well now you can! Tech decks or fingerboards are a safe way of skateboarding without the risk of injury. In order to ride a fingerboard you must use your middle and index finger to do tricks and steer.

Tech Decks (a popular fingerboard company) sell skate parks and fingerboards for about \$10. Some of these are rare and give you good cash return. Say you buy one for \$10 and it is rare, you might sell it for \$30! This means you made \$20 profit!
