Good luck to our seniors competing today! <u>**R.I.V.E.R students**</u> – What a pleasure it has been to hear on three separate occasions this week, from three different people, about the great manners and positive attitudes of our students! These great characteristics will help see our young people through a happy life!

<u>This Friday afternoon</u>, eight senior students have been chosen to participate in Mana Māori, at Te Awhina marae in Motueka. They will be learning alongside students from a number of other schools about the history, the legend, and the rules and playing of the team sport Ki-o-Rahi. This will be great preparation for the inter-school tournament that is coming up at Waimea Intermediate in two weeks' time.


